Welcome to the 2006 Anisfield-Wolf Book Awards ceremony. For more than 70 years, the Anisfield-Wolf Book Awards has recognized writers whose works contribute to our understanding and appreciation of the rich diversity of human cultures.

Jill Lepore New York Burning: Liberty, Slavery, and Conspiracy in Eighteenth-Century Manhattan

Jill Lepore is Professor of History at Harvard University and chair of the History and Literature Program. A contributor to *The New Yorker*, Lepore has also written for *The New York Times*,

The Los Angeles Times and American Scholar, as well as for many scholarly publications, including the Journal of American History and the American Historical Review. In 1999, she co-founded the online magazine Common-place.

In addition to the Anisfield-Wolf Book Awards, *New York Burning* was also a finalist for the Pulitzer Prize. Her other books include *A is for American* (2002) and *The Name of War* (1998), winner of the Bancroft Prize, the Ralph Waldo Emerson Award, the Berkshire Prize and a finalist for the J. Anthony Lukas Award.

Lepore has also received grants from the National Endowment for the Humanities and the American Philosophical Society, and has served as a consultant on many television and film projects, including PBS's *The American Experience*. She received her B.A. in English from Tufts University, an M.A. in American Culture from the University of Michigan and a Ph.D. in American Studies from Yale University.



Memorial Prize for Fiction and the Commonwealth Writer's Prize. Her second novel, *The Autograph Man*, was published in 2002 and received the *Jewish Quarterly* Wingate Literary Prize and was short listed for the Orange Prize for Fiction.

Smith is currently working on a book of essays on ethical thought in 20th century fiction. She is a Fellow of the Royal Society of Literature.

About New York Burning

In the winter of 1741, ten fires blazed across Manhattan, where one in five inhabitants were enslaved. With each new fire, panicked whites grew more suspicious of a slave uprising. That spring and summer, the New York Supreme Court condemned thirteen black men to be burned at the stake and seventeen hanged, while more than one hundred black men and women were thrown into a dungeon beneath City Hall. New York Burning tells their story.

William Demby on writing

- "Writing these novels was as often as not a sobering learning experience. Beetlecreek taught me that Truth is seldom a blazing billboard of light, but as often as not the revelation of a gently unfolding flower.
- "Writing The Catacombs was a monk's daily intimidating lesson revealing yet another quirky turn in the mysteriously meandering path of history.
- "Love Story Black, which I meant to be a lighthearted gothic medieval tale, still frightens me because of the terrifying power of what it leaves unsaid."

William Demby

Novelist William Demby, born on Christmas Day 1922 in Pittsburgh, PA, grew up in Clarksburg, WV. He attended West Virginia State College for a time, with World War II

interrupting his education. Demby entered the horse cavalry of the U.S. Army, served in both Italy and North Africa and wrote for Stars and Stripes.

After the war, Demby enrolled in Fisk University and received a Bachelor of Arts degree in 1947. He returned to Rome where he wrote filmstrips for the Italian film and television industries and translated Italian screenplays into English. Demby served as the English translator for virtually all of the important Cinecitta films by Antonioni, Fellini, Visconti and Rossellini, and was the assistant director for dialogue on Rossellini's "Europe 51," starring Ingrid Bergman. While in Italy, Demby wrote Beetlecreek, his first novel, published in 1950. Beetlecreek, a story of race relations in a remote West Virginia town, was praised by one reviewer as a new voice in African American literature, "one that is neither the ghetto realism of Richard Wright nor the ironic modernism of Ralph Ellison."

Demby followed with The Catacombs (1965), Love Story Black (1978) and Blueboy (1979). His work has been recognized for its distinct use of language and form, described as a unique pairing of traditional themes and modernist style.


